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TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their Report and Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2019. The activities of Sandy Gall's Afghanistan Appeal (SGAA) over this period were financed principally by its own efforts. The views expressed in the Report are those of the Trustees. The presentation of our Report is in accordance with guidance of SORP 2015. The Trustees also confirm that they have had regard to the Charity Commission Guidance in respect of Public Benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and planning future activities. In particular they considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives that have been set.

1. **Objectives of the Charity**:

- * To treat the disabled people of Afghanistan by the provision of prostheses, or orthoses and physiotherapy and assistive devices such as wheelchairs. To enable early correction of congenital problems of children such as Clubfoot and Hip Displacement;
- * To train students in these professions to carry out the work themselves;
- * To prevent further disability and promote better referral in the local community by providing health education and disability awareness information;
- * To upgrade the skills of the technicians already trained with further education and to provide administrative training and management courses for senior staff.
- 2. Structure: SGAA is governed by a Declaration of Trust dated 12th February 1986 and is run by a voluntary committee and consultants in the UK, including a former diplomat, a paediatric orthopaedic surgeon, a professional orthotist, a senior physiotherapist, a midwife, an experienced paramedic and a philanthropist. Eleanor Gall, Director and Trustee, was instrumental in setting up SGAA and the driving force behind many of its achievements, sadly died in September 2018, as mentioned in the previous annual report. Sandy Gall continues as Chairman. The consultants make regular visits to Afghanistan to see the project centres and outreach clinics, evaluating progress, giving seminars to include members of colleague NGOs and supervising technicians with more difficult cases. Members of the Committee are selected for their professional expertise, which enables them to play an active role in the supervision and monitoring of the charitable and other activities of the Charity. In Jalalabad and the eastern region of Afghanistan SGAA activities have been handed over to the management of Swedish Committee for Afghanistan (SCA) in 2006 and are now monitored by SCA's own staff. In Kabul, SGAA handed over SGAA activities at the rehabilitation centre in the 400 bed hospital to a national NGO, Kabul Orthopaedic Organisation (KOO) in 2004 and its physiotherapy clinic for women and children with disabilities in Khair Khana to the Afghan Red Crescent Society in March 2014.
- 3. **Relationships and Future Plans**: SGAA consultants have continued to visit Afghanistan when possible and provide their expertise to Afghan doctors, physiotherapists and technicians in SCA clinics and Ministry of Public Health hospitals. With support from Festival Medical Services this year, SGAA provided equipment and training opportunities to a team of Afghan surgeons in Mazar-e-Sharif. No technical visits were made to Afghanistan this year by the Committee due to the security situation but Afghan technicians attended courses and conferences in the UK instead.

Subsequent to this reporting period, it was decided at the Committee meeting of 6th November 2019 that the charity should be wound up by end of March 2020 due to diminishing funds and general agreement that the objectives of the Charity had been well achieved over the last 33 years.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

4. **Achievements and Performance:** Dr. Rahimullah, the paediatric surgeon that SGAA supports in Mazar-i-Sharif, visited the UK to attend the British Society for Children's Orthopaedic Surgery (BSCOS) AGM in March 2019 where a paper he had contributed to under the aegis of Philip Henman was presented titled: 'Surgical treatment of Late Presenting DDH (Developmental Dysplasia of the Hip) in an Afghan Hospital'. While better screening is still needed to combat late detection of DDH which is such a debilitating disease affecting girls particularly, delegates at the meeting were amazed at the level of surgery being undertaken. During 2018 Dr. Rahimullah reported he had performed 445 open hip reduction surgeries on children with DDH as well as treating 20 cases of neglected clubfoot.

Two of SCA's most expert technicians, a prosthetist/orthotist and physiotherapist, also visited the UK, with support of SGAA, having overcome considerable difficulties in obtaining their visas for which they had to apply in Islamabad twice! They attended a specialist training on Ponseti treatment for Clubfoot near Manchester in October 2018, from some of the UK's top practitioners. Since their return they've run courses for colleagues from SCA's four regional centres and ICRC's 7 centres studying all types of clubfoot particularly atypical clubfoot.

Two SCA technicians (former SGAA staff) also received their Category 1 Diploma from ISPO (International Society of Prosthetics and Orthotics), equivalent to a Masters degree, the highest level qualification along with Mahkpekai, Head Prosthetist/Orthotist at KOO (Kabul Orthopaedic Organization) herself a double amputee and one of the few qualified Category 1 women practitioners in the country. SGAA is currently supporting her financially as it is hard for national NGOs like KOO to raise funds for disability programmes.

- 5. **Public Benefit:** The main focus of activities during this year was:
 - Supporting the training and surgical work of paediatric orthopaedic surgeons in Mazar-i-Sharif and a scrub nurse.
 - Technical advice to technicians in the field and training support in the UK.
 - Funding for KOO to enable them to continue providing prosthetic, orthotic and physiotherapy services in Kabul.
 - Planning with the World Federation of Societies of Anaesthesiologists to run short courses to train Afghan anaesthesia givers.

6. Finance Review:

• Income for the year amounted to £25,923, representing donation and grants (£25,882), fundraising activities (£25) and Investment Income (£16).

Expenditure represented Raising Funds and Charitable Activities amounting to £30,507.

The resultant net expenditure for the year amounted to £(4,584) which decreased the balance carried forward on reserves to £49,305. These reserves are represented by cash of £52,195 net of creditors of £2,894.

The Trustees consider the financial position of the charity to be satisfactory.

6. Finance Review: (continued)

Reserves: There is a close correlation between income and expenditure in fundraising to support SGAA's continued monitoring of activities in Afghanistan. The twin disciplines of fundraising and low administrative costs enable it to operate with minimum cash reserves.

Investments Policy: The majority of balances are kept in CAF Bank accounts which alas provide meagre interest rates in the current climate.

- 7. **Risk Review:** During this period the security situation in Afghanistan precluded any visits of the Committee. The committee met twice in the year to discuss reports from the fields and meet visiting Afghan technicians.
- 8. **Fundraising:** Interest in and donations to SGAA often start with people seeing our website, www.sandygallsafghanistanappeal.org.

Organisations who gave generously during this financial year were Farol Ltd Festival Medical Services and individuals in memory of Mrs Eleanor Gall.

To these and all our other donors who continue to regularly send us cheques we are truly grateful.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2019

1. CONSTITUTION

The Sandy Gall Afghanistan Appeal Charitable Trust was constituted on 12th February 1986 by Declaration of Trust.

The Trust is a Registered Charity - Registration Number 294581.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation and Assessment of going concern

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st January 2015) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The accounts have been prepared to give a 'true and fair view' and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

(b) Funds

General funds represent the funds of the Charity that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application to the general purposes of the Charity. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the Charity are unrestricted. Restricted Funds are funds which are used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for a particular purpose.

(c) Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (CONTINUED)

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(d) **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings.

Expenditure incurred in Afghanistan is allocated to Activities Undertaken Directly and Support Costs, whilst UK costs apart from consultant and field costs are treated as Support costs.

Afghanistan costs are allocated in line with management accounts produced by the field staff.

(e) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets on a straight line basis over the expected useful lives of the assets concerned. Items of computer equipment are estimated to have a useful life of five years.

Trustees expenses incurred in the UK are disclosed above. Expenses incurred in Afghanistan form a small proportion of the monitoring and evaluation expenses. Included in support costs in the current year are Independent Examination Fees of £1,800 and in the preceding year UK fees of £1,800.

13. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During the course of the year the charity received a grant of £13,000 from Farol, formerly Helpful Hirings of which Mr John Gladwin was a Director.

During the course of the current and preceding year, the Chairman received reimbursed expenses of £2,400 (2018: £2,400).

In addition Michaela Gall, daughter of the Chairman, received £2,000 (2018: £1,500) for Administrative Support.

14. **CONTINGENT LIABILITY**

The Charity is in the process of negotiating certain tax liabilities in Afghanistan, which may result in an unknown liability to be paid to the Afghanistan Government. As no reliable estimate of the amount payable is available at present, no provision has been made in these accounts. The trustees have de-registered the Charity in Afghanistan and no liability is likely to materialise.

15. **POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS**

It is the intention that the Charity will be wound up at 31st March 2020.
